UNIVERSITY CORE REQUIREMENTS				<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Spanish and Portuguese Department requires a minimum of 18 upper-division major hours to be taken in residence at BYU for this degree program. These hours may also go toward BYU's 30-hour residency requirement for graduation. The Department of Spanish and Portuguese strongly recommends that StDev 317, a 2-credit-hour course, be taken at the end of the sophomore year or the beginning of the junior year. Because liberal arts degrees provide preparation in a variety of useful fields rather than a single career track, this course is recommended to help liberal arts students focus on specific educational and occupational goals and to identify the career options or educational opportunities available to them. The course will introduce them to the resources needed for accessing information about graduate schools, internships, careers, and career development. Students will learn basic employment strategies, including the steps necessary for obtaining employment related to their own specialty. <p>Minor, second major, or supporting coursework: Complete a minor from any department (approximately 16–21 hours), or complete a second (additional) major (approximately 30–60 hours), or complete 15 credit hours of courses (also known as Option II) from among the following related fields: a second modern foreign language (upper-division courses only); Latin, Greek, or English beyond the GE requirement; linguistics; classical civilization; Latin American history or geography; humanities; archaeology of Spain or Latin America; comparative literature; pre-medical school requirements; other areas approved by the department chair.</p> <p>Note: Latin American Studies or Portuguese Studies majors/minors: Port 321, 339, 345 or 355, and 441 or 451 meet requirements for both the Portuguese major and the area studies minor. Only one of these courses may be double-counted (applied to both the major and the minor). Students wishing to complete a Portuguese major and one of these area studies minors must take an additional 6–9 hours chosen from the approved electives for either major or minor. 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Note: An ACTFL Oral Proficiency Interview and Writing Proficiency Test are taken in connection with Port 491. It is expected that Portuguese majors will pass both tests with a rating of Advanced Low or higher.

Complete a minor from any department, or complete a second additional major, or complete 18 credit hours of courses from among a number of fields. (See the catalog or MyMAP for more detail.)

Note: Students are strongly encouraged to participate in a Portuguese language/culture immersion experience, such as an LDS mission, study abroad program, internship, a semester in the Foreign Language Student Residence, or a service learning course.

Strongly Recommended: Students planning to go on to a graduate degree in Portuguese should consider taking Port 377 and a second modern foreign language at the 200-level with a B or better.

Foreign Language Student Residence

The Foreign Language Student Residence provides live-in opportunities for students in Portuguese. A twenty-four-hour-a-day Portuguese rule assures participants intensive use of the language, under the direction of native speakers. See the department secretary at 3190 JFSB for information.

Foreign Residency

The department strongly recommends that all majors participate in an extended (at least two continuous months) and intensive language and culture experience in a Portuguese-speaking country or area:

A student should complete this requirement by:

1. Residency abroad (may include a Portuguese LDS mission, attendance at a foreign university, an advanced exchange program, or similar intensive foreign residence).
2. Participating in BYU Study Abroad Programs in Brazil or Portugal.
3. Participating in individual or group-arranged internship programs abroad as approved by the department.

Students unable to participate in one of these programs must spend at least one year (two semesters) in the Foreign Language Student Residence, pledging to use only Portuguese within the residence. Prerequisite to this experience is Port 201 or its equivalent; any exceptions must be approved by the department. THE MAJOR:

The undergraduate Portuguese major is a liberal arts program that aims to develop skills in critical thinking, written expression, and oral proficiency in the Portuguese language. The major should

provide a depth of understanding of and an appreciation for the Portuguese language and literary traditions and the multiple cultures that the language represents. It is designed to serve students who plan to enter the learned professions or pursue other career paths that require perceptive reading, orderly and clear thinking, intellectual maturity, effective writing, and acceptable oral communication. It is also designed to establish habits of broad spiritual thought and appreciation that will provide a source of life-long personal betterment and service to the extended community.

CAREERS:

Below is a list of potential career options for Portuguese majors. Many majors go on to professional schools (law, medicine, dentistry, business, etc.), where a liberal arts background is advised. A strong minor or second major in the employment area is strongly advised.

Business—management, sales/marketing, human resources, marketing research, advertising, finance, insurance, lobbying with business firms, insurance companies, bookstores, marketing research, museums, travel agencies, advertising agencies, real estate. Complete business minor, get related experience, earn leadership role in campus organizations, take advertising courses, take computer courses.

Education—teaching, research, administration, student affairs in colleges, universities, adult education, professional, and graduate schools. Obtain PhD for most teaching and research positions. develop one or more concentrations (linguistics, history, law, sociology, literary criticism), gain related experience, secure internship in area of interest.

Government—staff positions, congressional staffs, lobbying with federal and state governments, federal agencies including FBI, USIA, Commission on Civil Rights, State Department, DOE, FCC, Foreign Service, Federal Municipal Archives, National and State Endowments for the Humanities. Learn federal, state, and local job application process.

Translation/Interpretation—writing, editing, technical writing, journalism, advertising with publishing and insurance companies, travel agencies, magazine and newspapers, advertising agencies and professional/trade organizations. Serve on college newspaper staff; develop excellent writing and desktop publishing skills; take courses or minor in journalism, English, or advertising; get related experience, join professional organization.

Social/Community Services—staff positions or research for nonprofit organizations, immigration services, social services, public interest research groups, museums, libraries. Develop excellent verbal and written communication skills; gain related work experience, acquire master's degree in Library Science.
