Note 3: Students should consider taking Geog 271 (W) if they are not familiar with modern Middle East geography.

Note 4: ANES/HB students are encouraged to take at least one year of Greek.

Note 5: ANES/GNT students are encouraged to take at least one year of Biblical Hebrew.

Note 6: BYU-Jerusalem students may substitute Rel A 303 and 311 for Rel A 301 and 211.

Note 7: ANES-HB students may minor in Biblical Hebrew only with program and departmental approval.

THE DISCIPLINE:

Ancient Near Eastern Studies deals with the history, literature, religions, and cultures of the ancient Near East from 3000 BC to AD 640. It involves study in the humanities, social sciences, and ancient scripture. Geographically, the ancient Near East consists of the region currently designated the Middle East. The Ancient Near Eastern Studies major is structured to provide students with a broad understanding of the civilizations of the ancient Near East, and to emphasize the study of the Hebrew Bible and related literature or the Greek New Testament and related literature in their broader ancient Near Eastern context.

INTERNSHIPS:

All students majoring in International and Area Studies programs are encouraged to seek a meaningful experience with a foreign culture as part of their academic program. Credit earned while participating in a university-sponsored Study Abroad program, the Washington Seminar, international internships, or other supervised foreign experiences may be applied toward major requirements.
